2021 = 14.8% or 4,700 excess RIP.ie notices.

2022 = 18.4% or 5,800 excess RIP.ie notices.

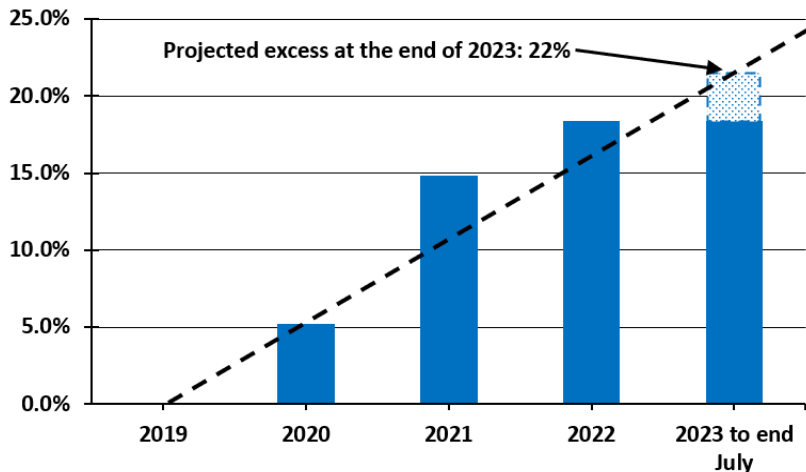
2023 = 18.4% or 3,400 excess RIP.ie notices
(to the end July).



Excess mortality is a measure of the number of people who have passed away above the average for the same period (year, month, week or day) in the previous five years. This is the international standard for assessing the health of a nation.

Trust NOBODY. Do your own research on RIP.ie. Compare the recent numbers of sudden, unexpected deaths and deaths after a short illness with any year before 2021. Look at the numerous photos of young faces in the notices.

Excess RIP.ie Notices



Since June 2020 TD's have tabled 15 questions in Dáil Éireann requesting data on excess mortality in Ireland and asking for an investigation. Both the Taoiseach, Leo Varadkar and Minister for Health, Stephen Donnelly have repeatedly claimed in written Parliamentary replies that there are no excess deaths. But the number of deaths officially registered by the General Register Office (GRO) and the death notices on RIP.ie tell a different story. The Irish Government has blocked all debate regarding excess mortality since 2020.

Also, why have these Deputies not objected to the replies they received and the refusal to investigate? Was it all just lip service or theatre? This is a serious issue and they must show some respect for the deceased.
